# Our Watchword: Eternity

**I** SAT in the house of God. Its dignified beauty lifted my soul. Music from an unseen organ invited to worship. The stillness seemed to say, "Listen for the voice of God." The world was shut out. Things high and holy engaged my thoughts—God, eternity, my own soul.

God—our Maker, Redeemer, and Comforter—was there to make Himself known to sinful man. In the house of God I learned to say, "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits." In eternity I, too, shall see Him face to face.
